The importance of the reservation policy in India has endowed the path of equality and it is further re-emphasized by various international instruments and covenants. Categorisation of people to whom reservation must be given is ambiguous, causing perplexity in practical application, forgery to establish them under a particular identity to receive privilege is also a problem, being the reasons for which reservation policies are always in a debatable position.
